- If you solve the problem, please contact your 4-H leader to receive your prize (limited number available)



(RED) An identification tag placed on the left leg of working elephants.

(BLUE) An identification tag placed around the neck of a cow.


(GREEN) An identification tag placed around the body of a goat.



(RED) An identification tag placed on the hip of a cow in a show or sale.

(BLUE) An ID tag placed on the leg of a goat about to be processed.


(GREEN) An ID placed on the back of sheep.



(RED) A tag pierced into the ear of a herding dog.

(BLUE) A tag pierced into the wing of a large bird, such as a turkey.

(GREEN) An ID tag pierced into the ear of a goat.



(RED) A band placed around the leg of a goat.

(BLUE) An identification band placed around the leg of a cow.

(GREEN) A band placed around the leg of a horse



(RED) Used for marking breeding pigs.

(BLUE) Used to stop leaks in your hot water heater.

(GREEN) Used for identifying dairy cows with mastitis in a dairy parlor.



(RED) A clipper used to clip bull's noses according to a number system.

(BLUE) A clipper used to clip piglets ears according to a numbering system.


(GREEN) A clipper used for the trimming a pig's hoofs.



(RED) A band pierced into the ear of a cow used for identification.

(BLUE) A band pierced into the ear of a sheep used for identification.

(GREEN) A band placed around a chicken or a duck's wing used for identification.



(BLUE) A branding iron that burns a scar into the side of a cow.



(BLUE) A branding iron that burns a scar into the side of a cow.



(RED) A ring pierced into the ear of working elephants so they can be roped together, making them easier to track.

(BLUE) A ring pierced into the nose of a bull to help to control and identify dominant bulls.

(GREEN) A ring placed around the necks of lambs to allow them to be spotted from a distance.



(RED) A band pierced into the ear of a cow for identification.

(BLUE) A band pierced into the ear of a sheep for identification.

(Yellow) A band placed around a chicken's leg for identification.



(YELLOW) A band placed around a smaller goats neck to identify breed.

(BLUE) A band placed around the ankle of horses to identify their breed.

(GREEN) A band placed around a cow's ankle identifying dry, sick, or problem cows.



(RED) A piercing gun used to make small holes in a cow's ear in the shape of numbers and letters.

(BLUE) A tattoo gun used to print identification numbers or letters on cow's ears.

(GREEN) A tattoo gun used to print identification numbers or letters on sheep's lips.



(RED) A band placed around a bull's nose ring to help with identifying the fertility of the bull.

(BLUE) A band placed around the legs of chickens for ID.

(GREEN) A band pierced into the ears of sheep for ID.



(Yellow) A branding iron that burns a scar into the side of a cow.

(BLUE) Used to punch holes in your homework.

(RED) A tag pierced into the ears of cattle for identification.

(BLUE) A tag pierced into the ears of sheep for identification.

(GREEN) A tag pierced into the dewlap of goats for identification.



(YELLOW) A paint stick used to differentiate pigs.

(BLUE) A paint stick used to mark out chicken territories.

(GREEN) A paint stick used under horses eyes to help protect from sun glare.



(RED) An electronic tag that holds breeding and health information of cows.

(YELLOW) An electronic tag used to track domestic animals.

(GREEN) An electronic tag implanted into wild elephants to help track them.



(RED) A pig ear tag.

(BLUE) A ear tag for dogs.

(GREEN) A cattle ear tag/tagger, tag less likely to be lost.
