COURSE DESCRIPTION:

This course presents fundamental principles and functions important in animal science. The scientific underpinnings of modern animal science are presented, with emphasis on nutrition, reproduction, animal domestication and behavior, animal welfare, genetics, and growth. The course deals with domestic animals, including both companion animals and livestock.
