COURSE DESCRIPTION:

Students receive training in dairy cattle anatomy and physiology, semen storage and management and artificial insemination technique. Precision Diagnostics personnel, assisted by Dr. Westendorf, teach the course.

1. Apply subject matter knowledge related to physiology, reproduction, and management in mastering the art of Artificial Insemination. (PLG 2)

Grading is based on a written test and success in "hands-on" insertion of an AI rod and proper semen deposition. Students successfully completing the course receive a grade from Rutgers and certification from Precision Diagnostics.
