COURSE DESCRIPTION:

Experience-based education (EBE) course that focuses on expanding experience handling, fitting, and working with livestock and companion animals as well as building teaching skills.

Prerequisites:

- Obtain medical clearance to work with animals[‡]
- Successful completion of Animal Handling, Fitting, and Exhibition 11:067:175 with relevant species AND/OR be approved by special handling demonstration facilitated by Instructor (Horse specifically).
- Be comfortable and confident handling, restraining, fitting/grooming, and showing relevant species.
- Be comfortable working with and teaching other students.

LEARNING GOALS:

The students will:

1. Expand their knowledge of proper livestock and companion animal handling, exhibition, behavior & welfare. (PLG 4, 7§)

<u>Assessment:</u> Observation of student's abilities and participation during scheduled weekly sessions. Student is responsible for maintaining a journal chronicling work completed.

2. Expand their skills and experience in livestock and companion animal fitting including clipping, shearing, carding, bathing, hoof trimming, braiding, etc. (PLG 4)

Assessment: Observation of student's abilities and skills during scheduled weekly sessions. Student is responsible for maintaining a journal chronicling work completed.
